MEMBERSHIP YEAR DRAWS TO A CLOSE - Submitted by Doris Asher, Membership Committee

Since the Society's fiscal year runs from July 1 to June 30 of each year, members for the 2018-2019 year who have not yet renewed their membership for 2019-2020 are now in arrears, and this July newsletter is the last one they will receive. Annual dues are \$8.00 for an individual plus an additional \$4.00 for each additional household member. For members who want to save significant money over time, the Society offers a life membership for a one-time payment of \$80.00. Forty-one people have already taken advantage of the life membership.

MINUTES OF MAY 18, 2019 GLOS GENERAL MEETING - submitted by Ioana Sonea, Secretary

A total of 27 members (including the speaker) attended (a quorum was present). Dot Barnett, Pete Ostlund and Chris Steele had plants and supplies for sale (20% of the purchase price going to GLOS). The delicious refreshments were provided by Tammy Scherer, Jim Churn, Dottie Winter and Ioana Sonea.

The meeting was called to order by President Dawn Kittle at 7pm.

- Dawn Kittle explained that many GLOS members had received spam emails that purported to be from her. She and other members encouraged anybody who received a suspicious email to verify the sender's address before replying: it should correspond to the address listed in the current GLOS roster.
- Doris Asher showed off the plants on the "Show and Tell" table, explaining their qualities and asking the growers for details on their culture. There were quite a few spectacular plants displayed, including a Laelia purpurata (now Cattleya purpurata) belonging to Dot Barnett, which received an AM of 84 points earlier in the day at the Great Lakes Judging Center. One particularly attractive item was a small display of beautifully grown and flowering miniature rupicolous Laelias arranged by Owen Neils.
- GLOS awards were announced by Dawn Kittle. Awardees got to choose a plant from one of the vendors present at the meeting.
 - o Julie Bishop received the first Lifetime Accomplishment Award ever given by GLOS, for all she has done and continues to do for GLOS. She has been an inspiration to the members of the organization, a positive force that has supported GLOS for many years. Julie grows her plants under lights and on windowsills, under sometimes trying circumstances such as losing power for 10 days during a winter storm a few years ago. She is always positive, and generously contributes plants to all show displays. Unfortunately, Julie and Dea were not present to receive the award: we hope they will be present at the June meeting.
 - o Pete Ostlund received the Silver Certificate of Appreciation for his many years of hard work organizing the yearly GLOS show, all the work he does at each meeting (setting up, helping meetings run smoothly) and his outstanding contributions of plants and time to show displays year-round.
 - o Doris Asher received the Orchidist of the Year Award, for all she has done and continues to do for GLOS. Despite her many other commitments and her numerous travels, Doris continues to ensure that every meeting is set up on time, has the supplies required, and that take down runs smoothly. Doris is the go-to proof-reader and error-catcher for the Calypso as well as for this secretary, keeps the archives of GLOS and has, as our President took care to point out, "kept Dawn under control" (read: has helped Dawn manage the intricacies of the presidency).
- Election of the Board for 2019-20. Mike Underwood presented the 2019 candidates for the Board (same slate of officers as in 2018-19) to the members and asked for any further nominations. Hearing none, Pete Ostlund made the motion to approve the slate of officers, seconded by Mike Underwood. The Board was voted in unanimously by all members present with the addition of two absentee votes submitted by email.
 - o Dawn thanked the members who had elected her to the presidency the previous year and re-elected her this year. For her, it was a gift: she lost her husband 2 years ago; serving as President helped her through the tough times that followed.

• Presentation:

- o Ioana Sonea gave a presentation on orchid viruses based on Janet Lamborn's original PowerPoint (with some slight modifications), provided by Agdia. The original speaker could not be present, so Ioana volunteered to bone up on orchid viruses, since the topic was of great interest to the members. The most common viruses affecting orchids, the symptoms of infection, ways to prevent infection, and ways to test for these viruses were discussed. The presentation was well received, with many questions from the audience.
- o Agdia had generously provided 30 Immunostrip kits to test for the 2 most common orchid viruses, the Odontoglossum Ring Spot Virus (ORSV) and the Cymbidium Mosaic Virus (CymMV). A demonstration of the tests was done using two plants with some ugly leaves, and one of the plants was shown to be infected with ORSV (and was promptly trashed).
- o Members are encouraged to bring in plants to be tested at the June meeting: the remaining 28 kits will be used at that time.
- o Agdia is offering 20% off any kit purchased by GLOS members within 30 days of the meeting: please contact Ioana Sonea for more details.

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MINUTES OF MAY 18, 2019 GLOS GENERAL MEETING, concluded

- Silent auction plants were all generously donated by Jean Maday, who is leaving the area. All were eagerly snapped up by GLOS members. The raffle table was also successful.
- Refreshments for the June meeting will be provided by Jerrie, Dawn and Ioana.

CONSERVATION -- Orchid Conservation in the Age of Climate Change by Tom Mirenda, American Orchid Society Conservation Committee Chair

Conservation can mean many things to many different people. When it comes to the environment, some believe it must involve tight control and regulation, while others feel 'nature should take its course.' We are living in a time known as the Anthropocene— a time where the dominance of humankind over the planet is so strong that our influence has affected the course of every living creature we share it with. Some compare the course of climate change to that of a steaming freight train about to hurtle over a cliff, while others see the undeniable shifts we are seeing as part of a longer continuum of change on a broader, geologic scale that would happen with or without human activity. The truth is probably somewhere in between these extreme views.

When it comes to the conservation of our precious Orchidaceae, the most biodiverse and species-rich family of flowering plants, we may truly have reached a crossroads where a laissez-faire approach could lead to mass extinctions over the coming decades. How tragic it would be if wild orchids disappeared and we could only see them in Botanical Gardens and private collections instead of the habitats in which they evolved and are a vital component. We in the field of Orchid Conservation believe the greater orchid community can do many things to protect and preserve orchids in their natural habitats. The AOS Conservation Committee (Conscom) is committed to using its resources towards promoting and facilitating the work of people around the world who genuinely love orchids and recognize the need to act in their defense.

Every year, the AOS provides Conscom with some funds to disburse to worthy conservation projects around the world, in the hope of nurturing the present (and the next) generation of orchid conservationists. Indeed, in the Anthropocene, it is only the actions and interventions of mankind that can produce positive change and correct our course into the future. While the corrections may be small ones, we see a worldwide trend towards conservation initiatives happening almost everywhere. The grants we offer are rather competitive, in that we currently have limited resources to distribute. But our hope is to build a larger program and endowment to increase the number and scope of projects we support well into the future.

This year, Conscom has approved funding for 5 projects, each involving collaborations between grass-roots local community-based organizations and partners in academia. It is a beautiful thing when local stakeholders recognize the need to protect a rare orchid from over collection, habitat degradation and climate change, as is the case in the Purace region of Colombia where the spectacular Masdevallia racemosa will be the focus of one of our projects. Another recipient of an AOS grant will go to two young men from a farming community in Viracochasi, Peru, who believe that an orchid reserve can coexist with sustainable agriculture in their village.

In Colombia, one of the most orchid rich nations in the world, we are supporting the activities of two new orchid reserves, one land purchased by the Orchid Society of Medellin and one by the Guanacas Foundation, where hundreds of species will be protected from deforestation and poaching. Their projects involve utilizing local graduate students and citizen scientists in the exploration and cataloguing of the myriad species within as these wild places have not yet been thoroughly botanized. It will be wonderful to learn of the treasure trove of species that occur and thrive in these natural areas, as well as the possibility of seeing them for ourselves one day on ecotouristic visits.

Conscom is also continually supporting North American orchid conservation efforts, including one exploring the natural ecology and distribution of Cypripediums in Alaska. As the American Orchid Society, we would love to see our funds put to work in America! Unfortunately, the costs of many American conservation projects are very high in comparison to what can be done in other regions of the world where salary and institutional costs are considerably less. A strong endowment, however, will allow us to support American orchid conservation efforts, especially those of our colleagues at Smithsonian's North American Orchid Conservation Center (NAOCC) https://northamericanorchidcenter.org/ a most worthy, capable and collaborative organization. Indeed, Jay O'Neill of their staff, received the prestigious Keenan Conservation Award for his work on the incredible GO Orchids website.

Historically, the AOS Conscom has supported projects around the world. With the support of the AOS and its membership (YOU!) we believe we can have a truly positive effect on the future preservation of the amazing biodiversity of the orchid family and by extension, the myriad creatures that share their, and our habitat on this incredible planet we all inhabit, well into the future.

GREAT LAKES JUDGING CENTER ORCHID SEMINAR 2019

In order to maintain his or her status as an accredited judge for the American Orchid Society, each judge must have twelve hours of continuing education each year. To assist their personnel in doing so, each judging center, such as our local one, the Great Lakes Judging Center, provides an educational session during each of its monthly judging sessions. However, it is difficult to offer twelve hours in this manner. Therefore, once a year, on the third weekend of June, we hold an educational seminar, which runs Saturday afternoon and evening and Sunday morning at excellent conference facilities provided by Washtenaw Community College in Ann Arbor.

We rotate through the Mid-America Orchid Congress show schedule for our topics. This year we concentrated on the Cattleya alliance covering genera, such as Schomburgkia, Brassavola, and Guarianthe. Next June the topic will be the Cypripedium alliance – all of the various "slipper orchids".

In addition to the 16 judges headquartered in the Ann Arbor judging center, about thirty-five other people attended this year's Seminar. These thirty-five included judges from the Toronto Judging Centre and the Cincinnati Judging

GLJC personnel.

Activities on Saturday open with official AOS award judging in which everyone is invited to participate. This year we gave seven AOS awards – amazingly, Dot Barnett transported to the event six of the seven awarded plants – three awards went to her, one went to Pete Ostlund, and Bill Bergman stole the show with an amazing Cypripedium Philipp (macranthos x kentuckiense), which got an Award of Merit of 82 points and also the very coveted Certificate of Culture Excellence of 90 points. Philipp was totally beautiful! Bill named his award winner for his granddaughter 'Hannah Fern'. Congratulations to our GLOS growers!

Center and also interested orchid people from the Cleveland and Toledo areas as well as from several of our Michigan-based orchid societies. The combination of people to ask questions of the presenters and to interact throughout the weekend provides vibrancy to the event that might be lacking if the seminar were limited to just the

We heard Jean Hollebone on "Brassavola Hybrids", Jean Allen-Ikeson on "Cattleya Chocolate Drop and Its Hybrids", Rob Halgren on "Demystifying Schomburgkias", Gordon Griffin on "Guarianthes of Costa Rica", Fred Clarke on "Today's Mini and Compact Cattleyas" and also on "Judging Mini-Catts", and Kristen Uthus on "Miniature Cattleya Relatives".

We had a delicious buffet dinner served in our seminar room; we bid on silent auction items; we had live auctions, with Lynn O'Shaughnessey and Dennis Seffernick serving as auctioneers. We shopped for orchids from Sunset Valley Orchids and New World Orchids. We ate snacks provided by the GLJC judges.

Then, suddenly, it was 1:00 on Sunday, and the Seminar weekend was over, to be renewed in 2020!
