

He had already brought cymbidiums for the silent auction. Needless to say, they were sold, with all proceeds going to the Society.

Larry Watson's orchids sales went well, and we thank him for coming to the meeting to sell his orchids.

Jolanta Piecuch, Marilyn Porter, Teresa Fowler and Michele Bridges volunteered to provide snacks for the April meeting.

Jerrie Nichols gave an excellent presentation on orchid problems, focusing on what orchids need to be truly happy and disease-free. She then discussed many of the "sick" specimens people had brought with the audience, giving some excellent advice on potting, fertilizing and general culture.

The silent auction and particularly the raffle table (with a very pretty Potinara in full bloom!) were very successful.

The meeting was adjourned at about 9pm.

The trophy for Photography, Class 104A and Class 104B went to John Diephouse for a fine black and white photo of a Phragmipedium entitled "In Repose".




EDUCATIONAL ORCHID SEMINAR IN ANN ARBOR - Doris Asher
